Tyger has been a chef for four years and has worked in kitchens for 10 years. She has a bachelor's in Culinary Management and is also a certified nutritionist.

She's been cooking since she was a teenager. She loves to cook. Her brothers liked to cook, also. In college, Tyger volunteered to cook the food for a group of students who watched football every weekend. Pretty soon, she was catering to five different households on football days, for about 20 people. Her hobby eventually became a job and her job became a career.

She has a degree in film and photography from



Cal State Northridge, in the San Fernando Valley in Los Angeles. She went to China for four and a half years to study and has a medical degree in Chinese herbal medicine. She has studied over 50 religions, and has been a practicing Buddhist and Shaolin monk for the last 17 years.

Tyger's two cats are her fur-babies, a boy and a girl. About First UU she says, "I love the open-mindedness here and everyone's acceptance." She encourages

people to come volunteer in the kitchen. There will be a refresher course for the food handler's certification so those helping can handle food safely. She will also go over the expectations of how to serve others.

She loves getting to know people one-on-one and feels that a kitchen is one of the best places to do that, because it's a relaxed environment. Check in with her soon, as she helps us to welcome people back to campus.

This is a natural time for some introspection about the paths we've traveled this year and where we hope to go next year. While the Youth and Young Adult Programs have been inactive in the past year or more, we have begun advertising to fill the Youth & Young Adult Coordinator staff position and hope to have someone in place by late August! Along with myself, Everardo Aguilar, Vanessa Pool, and Jillian Irving are on the hiring committee, and should be scheduling interviews by early July.

We also have some exciting Adult RE offerings in the works for the summer and early fall. Already, Marge Wurgel has begun her new, four-week "Blossoming Through Mindfulness" course, and I'm working in collaboration with Jan Garbosky to offer an Adult RE Speaker series. Our goal with the Speaker Series is to invite prominent UU's and other like-minded

individuals to speak about a topic each month.

We're hoping to begin in August and September with Peter Bolland (a crowd favorite for many in our congregation) both of which will focus on combating racism and white supremacy. In the months that follow, we plan to invite other UU ministers and professionals of color to speak on topics meaningful to them. In this way, we're hoping to reinvigorate our Adult RE Program while also continuing the work we're called to do by both the Commission for Institutional Change's report, "Widening the Circle of Concern," and our commitment to the 8th Principle in general. The Speaker Series will take place on Zoom in order to allow us to attract prominent speakers from across the nation and more easily invite others in our region to join us.

I'm excited to be planning these programs and hope you'll be excited to participate! So even if you're taking a vacation this summer (perhaps the first in some time!), I hope you'll join me for a little "staycation" right here at First UU!



Reflections On The Past Year at First UU

I can confidently say, as a congregation, we're in better shape than we were this time last year. Due to a series of cataclysmic events, we faced the possibility of having no ministerial presence for the entire year. I didn't see how staff, or the board, could function during that time without ministerial

leadership. I also didn't know how our congregation would be fed spiritually without a minister to help us.

We began by luring Rev. Omega from Wisconsin as our Assistant Minister. We then created the minister in residence program with the UUA, who provided us with ministers during this transitory year. This program insured that Rev. Omega wouldn't have to attempt the ministry of First UU all by herself. It also insured that the board, staff, and congregation would have ministerial nourishment and leadership for the year.

We deliberated about hiring a developmental minister, instead of entering into a formal search for a new lead minister and surveyed the congregation regarding what our top priorities were for that minister.

We conducted a nation-wide search for a seasoned clergy person to lead us for the next four to seven years as we wrestle with these issues:

- What it means to be a two-campus congregation,
- Whether we sell our property or stay on the Hillcrest campus,
- Continuing to heal from our past hurts.

Let me take a moment here to explain the program we're entering into and what it means for us.

Some folks were wondering why they did not get to meet or vote on this minister. The leadership felt that with so many huge questions before us, we wanted to reassess our identity, and who we are as a congregation before we call a Lead Minster for a longer, more stable time. The developmental minister we hired, the Reverend Justine Sullivan, will serve as our Lead Minister until we're ready to enter the process to call a new Lead Minister.

As I look back over the past year, I'm in awe of the folks who serve on your board, including Laura Ball, Rosalba Ciampi, Brian Krohne, Karen Lamphere, Sue Marberry, Cora Pendergast, Rhiannon Roselle, and Louise Titlow. Each of them went through some very challenging personal times and yet were incredibly generous with the time they gave, not only to serving on the Board, but attending First UU services, hosting Board chats, going to Journey Toward Wholeness meetings, and numerous other information sharing meetings. I urge you to reach out and thank them.

In the Gospel of John, John 5:1-5, there's a story I've been reflecting on for the last few months. In Bethesda, there was a pool that people in need of healing would go to. Jesus saw somebody laying by the side of the pool for a long time. Jesus asked him why he was there for so long and if the man wanted to be healed. The man said someone needed to stir the water before he could go in and be healed. Jesus challenged the man to get in on his own and then walk back into his life.

I challenge us all to do the same. No one thing is going to heal all the hurts in our congregation. We can't wait for some magic water stirrer. We must take responsibility for our own healing and I hope we're kind and gentle to each other, as we make our way into First UU's future, with one of the most awesome women I know, Cora Pendergast, as your new Board President. Blessed be.

Ministry Teams: Home To All First UU's Groups

I've found that many First UU members and friends aren't aware that all groups within our congregation (including Affiliated Groups and Affinity Groups) function within one of our eight Ministry Teams:

- Caring: Providing practical and lay pastoral care
- **Connections:** Membership and hospitality for visitors, members, and friends
- Family & Lifespan: Religious education for Children, Youth, Young Adults and Adult Education Classes
- **Generosity:** Fundraising activities including renewal of Financial Commitments
- Larger UU Connections: Cooperating with local, national, and international UU organizations such as De Benneville Pines, Pacific Western Region of the UUA, General Assembly
- **Social Justice:** Working for social justice at First UU and in the wider community
- **South Bay:** Worship and activities on the Chula Vista campus
- Worship & Program: Coordinating Sunday services including music

Each Ministry Team is co-led by a lay leader and a staff member. In the past, the co-leaders for each Ministry Team met together as the Ministry Team Council. Now, the co-leaders submit information on the year's activities for First UU's Annual Report, published in June of each fiscal year and available in the Members Area of our website.

While groups within a Ministry Team may work together, they are also encouraged to collaborate with groups in other Ministry Teams to organize and implement activities to create community, nurture spiritual growth, act on our UU values to help heal the world and work toward First UU's Strategic Plan goals. Each Ministry Team has a budget— 10% of which must be spent to enhance diversity, equity, and inclusion in their work or gatherings—to ensure all feel welcome and respected.

It's been a LOOOONG time since First UU groups have been able to meet in person. Fortunately, many groups were able to meet on Zoom during the pandemic. As things open up a little and we look forward to being able to gather in person, here's a list

of Ministry Team groups as you think about reconnecting, consider joining, or creating a new group:

- Caring Ministry Team: Caregivers/Allies Support Group, Caring, Coping with Chronic Conditions, Lay Ministry, Memory Matters
- Connections Ministry Team: New Members, Neighborhood Groups, Welcome Table
- Family & Lifespan Ministry Team: Adult Faith Formation, Adult Religious Education, Children's Programs, Young Adult & Campus Ministry, Youth Programs
- **Generosity Ministry Team:** B&B Program, D4\$, Book Room, Gift Cards, Financial Commitment Renewals, Planned Giving, Specialty Sales, Vehicle Donation
- Larger UU Connections: Denominational Relations, Friends of de Benneville Pines, UU Service Committee, Partner Church Committees (Romania and Philippines), UU at United Nations Office
- Social Justice: Clean Elections, Climate Justice, Generosity Offerings, Organizing for Justice, Palestine-Israel Justice, Rainbow Action, Reproductive Justice, Sanctuary, SOLACE (Souls Offering Loving and Compassionate Ears), South Bay Food Pantry, Uptown Faith Community Service Center
- **South Bay:** All South Bay campus activities (which during the pandemic have been on hiatus while the Food Pantry used their space)
- Worship & Program: Archives, Art Guild, Book Lovers Affinity Group, Buddhist Sangha, Cosmos, Earth-Centered Spirituality Group, Dances of Universal Peace, Hillcrest Folk Song Circle, JUUL Tones Vocal Ensemble; Looking Glass Theatre, Meditation Groups, Memorial Wall, Music Ministry (Handbell Ensembles, Chalice Choir, JUUL Tones Vocal Ensemble, Women's Choir), UU Christian Study Group, UU Men's Fellowship, UU Seniors

Meet First UU's Affiliated Groups

First UU Affiliated Groups are organizations recognized as having activities integral to our mission and vision AND are self-supporting. All are related to First UU through a Ministry Team responsible to the Lead Minister. (Don't know what our Ministry Teams are? See accompanying article on page 6)

There are currently four operating Affiliated groups Groups, five inactive (Women's Singletarians, Federation. Dynamic Duos, Women Together, Humanists), and one group (South Bay Food Pantry) working on requesting approval. To qualify for recognition, a group must submit information to and be approved for recognition by the Lead Minister. According to First UU's Constitution:

- At least one leader must be a Voting Member of First UU.
- The group must provide a statement of purpose and agree to:
 - abide by Board policies and governance structure or decision-making process and
 - submit reports of activities and finances on at least a yearly basis.

Once approved, the group is authorized to elect their officers, establish their own rules, and determine their own programs without restriction—as long as the programs are carried out in a manner consistent with Board policies and First UU's mission and vision.

Recognition as an Affiliated Group may be revoked by the Lead Minister (with approval of the Board) for any group/organization whose activities are found to be inconsistent with Board policies or no longer reflect our mission and vision.

All four ongoing and active Affiliated Groups are part of the Worship & Program Ministry Team and include:

Art Guild: Since 1973, the Art Guild has promoted the work and enrichment of San Diego regional artists through shows (including receptions) and discussions. Participation in other First UU activities are encouraged but not required for participation in the Guild. The Art Guild will resume regular meetings in September 2022. Earth-Centered Spirituality Circle (ECSC): This group provides a safe place for individuals and families of all structures to explore Pagan and Earth-Centered spiritual paths. They honor in ritual the Eight Sabbats of the Wheel of the Year, lead periodic Religious Education classes, and participate in outreach to the wider community to those seeking a spiritual home in which their beliefs are honored and affirmed. Looking Glass Theatre (LGT): LGT opened in 1986 with a mission to continue building an intergeneration community with families and individual who, as part of their personal ministry, enjoy sharing and presenting performing arts.
