Meet Zane Shrem-Besnoy, Sound Engineer

Zane Shrem-Besnoy is our new Sound Engineer, the person you see setting up the microphones and other sound equipment for Sunday. He's worked with us since August 2022. Before he came to work at First UU, he had several connections to other members of our staff. He knows

Marshall Voit, our Music Director, from working with him at the Temple Emmanuel. Joe Cantrell, who worked with our audio for a long time, was his professor at USD. Finally, he worked with Jeff Pekarek, who was our previous Sound Engineer.

Zane coordinates the audio for both our worship services and concerts. This includes the streaming audio for our online services. He mixes the sound for the Meeting House and also online to make sure the recording is done cleanly.

Zane has been working with audio production since he was in high school, at the San Diego Metropolitan Regional Career and Technical High School, a charter school on the Mesa College campus. It was there Zane first interned in event planning and audio production. One internship was booking concerts and events at the House of Blues downtown. His senior project was booking a concert at Queen Bee's, a venue in North Park. He was responsible for selling tickets and managing marketing materials.

Having completed a certificate of Music Theory at Mesa College while still in high school, Zane also has a degree in Music Composition from USD with a minor in English and poetry. His ability as a composer has led to his music being featured in a ballet, two award winning musicals, and experimental music happenings all around San Diego.

Currently, Zane is a theater manager with San Diego Dance Theater at Liberty Station, where he's responsible for lighting design and theater maintenance. He also hosts an open mic at Public Square, a coffee shop in La Mesa, on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays.

He takes voice lessons, trying experimental techniques such as overtone and throat singing. He also writes music, and has recordings at Alexander Shrem-Besnoy.com

Zane believes music can build community. He'd like to create platforms that highlight new forms of music expression. While he enjoys electronic, punk, and rock music, he believes all these types of music intersect more now. He also wants to promote music literacy, emphasizing the need to listen critically to new sounds and new ideas.

I do love that song by Bob Marley. It has a catchy tune and a cheerful rhythm, but it's the simplicity of the message, the confident reassurance that always gets me. I've been known to sing it to myself from time to time, and it reminds me to pause and breathe.

Covid didn't invent anxiety, but it sure did dump extra anxiety into every system: schools, congregations, families, workplaces. Sometimes. a shared

challenge creates camaraderie as we battle a common problem. But anxiety can also cause mistrust and greater separateness.

We've seen increased hate crimes against people of Asian descent since the arrival of Covid, and an increase in gun violence. Lately, we've seen people being shot for knocking on the wrong door or mistakenly getting into the wrong car-innocent mistakes that should've been instantly recognized, forgiven, and resolved but were not.

The culprit, I believe is twofold—first, there are too many guns. Second, we're afraid of one another. People in power are stoking that fear, suggesting there are "bad guys" out there who want to harm us. Making someone afraid and then giving them access to lethal weapons is a recipe for tragedy.

We can work for commonsense gun reform, and work to reduce the fear of one another by widening the circle, by increasing every day who we mean by "us."

As Marge Piercy writes:

It goes one at a time. It starts when you care to act. It starts when you do it again after they say no. It starts when you say we and know who you mean; and each day you mean one more.

encourage you to come.



And as we do all these things, we build community and connections in ways that there aren't many other opportunities to do so.

New Bidders: If you're new to D4\$, you'll need to *register*.

<u>Past & New Bidders</u>: If you haven't received an email invitation by the end of May: Check your spam and junk email folders.

Call the office to make sure we have your correct email address or check with the D4\$ team member after a Sunday service.

Bidding: Preview the Catalog online to get ideas of what you want to bid on!

- If you need assistance with your bidding, and can do it in person, complete proxy bidding sheets which will be available after each service starting Sunday, June 4th.
- Bidding starts online on June 1st and run 24/7 through June. You'll be

- notified via email, if you're outbid, or if you win one or more items. For best chances of winning your items, use the 'Buy It Now' feature.
- Trained volunteers will help you register and bid after services in June.
- Once bidding is completed you can pay for your items online, or arrange manual payments with *Robie Evans*.
- Because the system doesn't allow multi-tiered pricing, if you bid on Family Price events, please do not pay invoices online until you get an adjusted invoice.
