Journey Towards Wholeness - Who We Are and Why We Do the Work

The Journey Towards Wholeness Committee was created in 1997 as a committee of the Board. Their mission is to help the Board and ministers promote, monitor, and assess the work of dismantling systems of oppression to help First UU become a genuinely anti-racist, anti-oppression, multicultural institution.

Their goals are to:

- Create and maintain connections with the anti-oppression and racial justice initiatives of the UUA and UUSC, and to create channels of communication and invitation for wide participation from our congregation in these initiatives.
- Work closely with the Social Justice Executive Team (SJET) and our other social justice teams to encourage multiple ways to bring the lens of racial justice to bear on the full range of justice issues in which we engage.
- Create and support ongoing education of our congregation on white privilege and white supremacy culture, the harms that arise from internalized racism, and how to become more effective in anti-racism
- Seek opportunities to support anti-racism events, actions, protests, and advocacy in the greater San Diego region, especially those initiated by BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) organizations and leaders.

The current members of the core JTW team are Rosalba Ciampi, the liaison from the Board; Valerie Jaques (who is rotating off the team to become Board Vice President), Bill James; Ruth Turner, and Tonia Vyenielo.

When asked what compels them to do this work, they said:

Rosalba: "Since I've adopted two children of color from two different countries (Nepal and the Congo) I've discovered what it means to live with diversity and marginalization.

Valerie: "I've discovered that it is unusual to come from a privileged family that recognizes its racism. My mother said, "I know I'm racist, I have to work on that."

Bill: "I'm very aware that I'm living a segregated life. I want to be in community with diverse people who would enjoy First UU but don't feel comfortable here yet."

Ruth: I thought First UU was doing very good work on diversity and inclusion until we had the BIPOC defection a few years ago. I want to understand what caused that rift and I want to make sure

we don't continue those misunderstandings between people of different racialized identities.

Tonia: Percy Shelley, "An identification of ourselves with the beautiful which exists in thought, action, or person, not our own."

To help with this understanding, Ruth and Louise Titlow will be starting a 'Racialized Identities' book group to read and discuss our different experiences and how they can work together to create a better community. In the last year, on a 5th Tuesday with the Board, the team led a discussion of the "Rethinking Thanksgiving" toolkit produced by the Indigenous Solidarity Network. JTW sponsored an anti-racism workshop last October, presented by the San Diego Chapter of SURJ (Showing up for Racial Justice). For the last two years, JTW and other members of the congregation have reviewed the Widening the Circle of Concern report of the UUA's Universalist Association's) (Unitarian Commission Institutional Change which outlines the improvements needed for the anti-oppressive and anti-racism practices of the UUA and its congregations.

This year, JTW will be working on a covenant with the Board on what is meant by wholeness in Journey Towards Wholeness. The team points out that the most diverse community at First UU is currently our youngest members, the children. JTW members also want to talk more often from the pulpit about their efforts to reach their goals.

What a year! Lifespan Programs at First UU have blossomed in the 2022-23 church year as we regained the ability to gather in-person and rebooted some of the programs that were put on hold over the past few years.

With the addition to our staff of Youth and Young Adult Coordinator, Lara Anderson, we now have three groups meeting regularly during the 10 am Service. Most notably, we have a youth group that, in addition to meeting on Sundays, plans monthly youth outings that included a trip to Jump Zone, a pumpkin carving party, a trip to the Science Center, and a visit to Mission Trails. Our Young Adult Group has also been established and meets weekly on Thursday nights for conversation, community, and fun.

We hosted several multigenerational events that included a beach bonfire, a trip to the Kumeyaay Cultural Center in Barona, our 150th Anniversary Festival, and, recently, our annual All Church Camp at Camp de Benneville Pines. As of right now, we have 86 campers registered for camp with 1/3 of those registered under the age of 17. There are two more muliti-generational gatherings planned for this summer on Saturday evenings, July 22 and August 19. Mark your calendars and look for more information about these events in The Window.

In May, we wrapped up the first session of Our Whole Lives (Grades 7-9) we've offered in three years. Eight participants joined us from across the region. This summer, we'll have some time to plan the reboot of our Bridging and Coming of Age programs in the fall.

We've begun offering our monthly Parents Night Out program, where we provide dinner and childcare for an evening so parents can get some much-needed time for themselves. Over the summer, we'll be offering three more of those evenings on June 29, July 27, and August 24.

We've released five episodes of a new podcast, The First Source, in which I interview First UU congregants about issues of faith, spirituality, congregational life, and life in general. Episode 6 will be a special Camp edition in which I'll interview campers who attend our All Church Camp. <u>Link to First Source podcast</u>

Finally, we've hosted a very successful monthly Adult RE Speaker Series with over 180 individuals participating to hear speakers from across the nation. This series also helped some of the smaller UU congregations in our region by providing Adult RE program offerings to communities who don't have the numbers and resources that we are fortunate enough to have. We'll pause our Speaker Series over the summer months and, in their place, schedule several in-person, Adult RE dinner conversations at our South Bay Campus.

I look forward to seeing you at these summer events.

None of these were a given in the late summer of 2021. You all have made this beauty happen. You've turned the individual brushstrokes into a loving community again. This community worked through grief and uncertainty, getting to a place of readiness to embrace the challenges of today and tomorrow. It's been an honor to accompany you in this process of learning and growth (for this congregation and for me, personally and professionally).

Our Next Intern Minister: Swamini Adityananda Saraswati

Our next intern minister will be Swamini Adityananda Saraswati. She's a Hindu Unitarian Universalist, who will be working with us part-time for the next two years. Swamini is a monastic who took vows on the banks of the Ganges River over 10 years ago. Swamini is the feminine for Swami, which means a renunciant and spiritual teacher. Adityananda is the name given to her when she became a monastic. And Saraswati is the monastic order she belongs to, much as Catholic priests might belong to the Franciscans or the Jesuits.

Originally from the Chicago region, Swamini lived in India for twelve years, returning to the USA during the pandemic. While residing in India, Swamini spearheaded the development and growth of the Global Interfaith WASH Alliance (GIWA). She was responsible for its original concept, overall design, strategic plans, programs, partnership development, general operations, policy publications and fundraising for nearly a decade. She strove to address poverty, climate change, child marriage, water scarcity and public

health concerns. Largely as a result, GIWA was globally launched at UNICEF World Headquarters, in partnership with UNICEF, the Government of the Netherlands, and USAID. She subsequentially conceptualized and led campaigns that impacted millions, resulting in accolades including a Guinness World Record.

Swamini also served as the Interim Executive Director of the world's largest interfaith organization, United Religions Initiative, as well as the Associate Executive Director of the Elijah Interfaith Institute, which works closely with faith leaders including the Pope and Dalai Lama.

Prior to that, she co-founded the Pan-African Association, a refugee mutual-assistance agency which enabled thousands of survivors of war, hunger, genocide, persecution, and torture from across the world to survive and thrive. She later spearheaded rights-based campaigns with a large international charity, including in five African nations, a war zone, and other global locations.

Now, as she takes her next steps in her vocation of service to humanity, she is working towards a Master of Divinity at Meadville Lombard Theological School and sits on the Board of UU Ministry for Earth. She chose to become a UU minister as a continuation of UU's long association with Hinduism, including as part of the Brahmo Samaj (a monotheistic sect), of which her hero, Swami Vivekananda (1863-1902), was once a member. Unitarian Universalism also resonates deeply with her interfaith spirit and prophetic style of ministry. She greatly appreciates how Unitarian Universalism is there for everyone, without restrictions, and looks forward to joining and serving the First UU family in September.
