We've important work to do as a congregation, and we want to grow as individuals in the process. We want our heartfulness, our kindness, our commitment to one another, and our values to show up in all our interactions. Most of all, the Right Relations Team would love for all of us to feel great about being part of First UU.

Purpose: Relationships

How do we want to be with one another? We believe the answer is about connecting more deeply, listening non-defensively, being more loving. Perhaps we could each reach out to one person a week who is new, or alone, or is simply someone we have not met.

We aspire to be a congregation accepting of those who are different from us, extending grace to one another, and giving others the benefit of the doubt. We want to learn new skills and create processes that will allow conflicts to transform us, rather than debilitate us.

How do we make that happen?

The Right Relations Team was formed by Rev. Justine to take up this challenge. The members are: Marla English, Brandon Hall, Bill James, Dan Paul, and Rev. Justine Sullivan. We were voted in by you, members of the congregation, which means you have placed your trust in us. Thank you. We will do our very best—because each of us, like you—love this church, love our shared values, and love the people.

<u>Transparency.</u>

We'll be transparent in sharing our thinking and our plans—before making any decisions. We promise to keep you informed. We want your ideas and will ask for your feedback at each step. (See link at the end of this article.) The African proverb comes to mind: If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go with others.

These periodic articles in First Words will serve as an ongoing journal about our work-in-progress.

First Thoughts about Goals

These are the ideas we listed at our first meeting. Please give us your opinion, and help influence our direction.

- Agree on a vision statement (as a congregation) of how we want to be with one another, and how we aspire to "show up" as a congregation.
- Incorporate our UU Principles, our Church Covenant, and our values into this work.
- Learn from the past. Draw lessons from the Listening Circle findings and from exit interviews.
- Provide training around managing the tensions that are inevitable when congregations grow and change.
- Model and coach creative conflict for our church community.
- Offer tools and skills that can help improve relationships at church (and at home).
- Revisit the existing Conflict Resolution Guidelines and make them available to all.
- When conflicts occur, create brave spaces where people can move from defensiveness to understanding. If conflict becomes more heated, offer opportunities for deep listening and a restorative process. Utilize the guidance of the ministers and the Board when appropriate.
- Create new listening opportunities to stay abreast of concerns.
- Create a measurement tool to determine a baseline on these issues now, and assess progress yearly.

Sneak Preview: Lifespan Faith Formation 2023-24



Here we are in September. I find myself asking, as I'm sure many of you do too, "Where did the summer go?" It also occurs to me this is the first time in four we've vears that started the church with vear а comprehensive plan for programming that covers the full range of "Lifespan" Ministry

(thanks, COVID!). I'm very excited about all the things we've planned for the coming year, and I'd like to share those plans with you.

On Sundays, we'll offer three options for Children & Youth during the 10:00 a.m. service, but this year, we'll be using Tapestry of Faith curricula rather than Soul Matters. This will allow us to have a better sense of the scope and sequence of the programs we run and will also allow the Lifespan Staff to plan farther ahead through the year (Soul Matters was released month-by-month).

- Kate Collier will be leading the PreK 2nd Grade Group using "Chalice Children," which gives children a comprehensive introduction to the UU culture, values, and practices.
- I'll be leading "Riddle and Mystery" with the 3rd 5th Graders. This is a children's version of a "Big Questions" curriculum.
- Lara Anderson will lead the social justice based curriculum, "Heeding the Call," with our Jr. and Sr. High Youth. The Youth Group will also continue to plan monthly, non-Sunday outings and events for Youth. These events give youth and their families the opportunity to gather in community during the week.

After service on Sundays, we'll offer three programs for those who choose to stick around and participate.

- Lara, along with Liz Jones, will lead our Coming of Age Program for Youth in Grades 8 - 12. Typically, this would be for 8th Grade youth, but we're expanding the age range this year to allow high schoolers to participate who missed out during the COVID shut down.
- I'll be offering "Jubilee Kids," an anti-racism program purchased for the Lifespan Program by our Journey Toward Wholeness Team.
- Kate will lead a Children's Music Program.

We're planning to host an Our Whole Lives (OWL) training this year, the UUA's human sexuality curriculum, to continue to build our pool of OWL Facilitators and offer OWL on a regular rotation.

Our Young Adults have been meeting regularly throughout the spring and summer and will continue this year. Young Adults gather on Tuesday evenings from 5:30 - 7:00 p.m. in room 114b. You may have also noticed some of our Young Adults tabling on the Patio again each Sunday! We've reached the point where the group is vibrant enough to begin planning how they'd like to be more involved in the broader life of the congregation.

For families, we'll continue to offer monthly Parents' Night Out, a program where we provide dinner and childcare so parents can have a night to themselves. Additionally, parents gather on the 1st Sunday of the month for Parents' Lounge, and we host an outside group, Transforming Families, on 1st Sundays from 1:00 - 2:30 p.m. to support families with Trans members.

Last, but not least, we have some exciting programs for adults planned. Our Adult RE Speaker Series was a hugely successful model for Adult RE, meeting monthly on Zoom for a 90-minute presentation. We'll be continuing that model this year and already have a program on Artificial Intelligence scheduled on August 31st and a Reproductive Justice presentation on October 24th.

The First UU Art Guild was formed on April 12, 1960. The purpose of the Art Guild is to "bring beauty and culture to church members and grounds in the form of diverse art, art shows, and artist discussion groups."

Over the years, the Art Guild has been asked to collaborate on many First UU projects. To walk onto our campus is to become aware of the aesthetic interest here.

Bard Hall Gallery is an official gallery in the San Diego art scene and offers the space to artists in the congregation and from the community to display their artwork in a comfortable setting. We seek established, underrepresented, and aspiring visual, photographic, mixed media, and fabric artists. We especially encourage young people to get involved. You do not have to be a First UU member, and there are no fees to submit a piece of art. We will work with you to get your piece ready to display.

The Art Guild holds gallery showings 3-4 times per year, each with an applicable theme. Our current show, entitled "Harvest of Art" will be up through October. In addition, we'll have a call for artists for our annual "holiday" show with a deadline for submissions of October 30. This show will hang in November and December.

The Art Guild group is re-creating itself after the shut-down of past years. We meet every other month as a steering committee on the months when there gallery is no opening/reception. We're hoping that participants in this steering group can find ways to expand creative expression throughout congregational life. Art can be a spiritual practice and we want to support one another as we move along our creative path.

The reception for the "Harvest of Art" show will be on Thursday, September 21, from 6-8 pm in Bard Hall. Our next steering committee is Thursday, October 12, 6 pm on Zoom. Please come to one, or both, to see what we're about.


